



Dear Friends,

Thursday 21st May is Ascension Day when we remember Christ returning to his Father.

Ascension Day is also the beginning of Thy Kingdom Come which is a worldwide prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost on 31st May. Christians from 172 Countries and 65 denominations have taken part in praying for friends and family to come to faith in Jesus Christ.

The days between Ascension and Pentecost have always been full of expectation and anticipation. So the renewed call across the Church is to set these days apart to pray, and each individual to pray for five people to come to know the love of Jesus Christ.

On the Circuit web site each day will be posted a Bible passage, short reflection, prayer and a suggestion for action from the Prayer Journal.

Also churches across Suffolk have met and we have felt it important, especially in these days, to light up Suffolk with prayer. We have drawn together a pattern of prayer; you may wish to do all of it or some of it.

Each morning pray a blessing for your community, those in need, those serving, including key workers — I think that this is something we could do whilst looking out of the window or standing by our front door. There is a suggested prayer

Mid-day pray the Lord's Prayer set an alarm to remind you if that helps. Phone a friend and pray with them.

5-5-5 – At 5p.m., pray for five minutes for five people - that they would know more of the Light of Jesus Christ in their lives

Light up Suffolk with prayer poster for you to colour in and put in your window (or design your own poster), you are also asked to light a candle in the evening for all to see, and/or you could put fairy lights around your window – this is so that we witness that we are praying for all people.

Bradfield Chapel Anniversary 2020

Standing alone, without the faithful community at Bradfield the 153rd Chapel Anniversary will be reached on 17th May 2020.
