I was reading the Methodist Recorder this week and came across the article:-

Did you know....?

The average British person's "bits and bobs drawer" contains six batteries, three phone chargers, five "unspecified" cables and four takeaway menus.

It is also home to four mysterious keys with no known lock, six pens and pencils, and five instruction manuals.

Research of 2,000 adults found 55% keep their drawer in the kitchen, while a quarter have theirs in the front room.

Thought for the Day for 15th April 2021 by Liz Kearsley

This week we are marking the death and celebrating the life of Prince Philip the Duke of Edinburgh. You will all know that he was nearly 100 years old and had been married to our Queen for over seventy years. What has struck me as I have watched television documentaries about his life is how committed he was to "serving" in so many different capacities. He was committed to the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth and has supported Queen Elizabeth throughout her long reign through the many trials and tribulations that have occurred. It is his lifetime of service that so many people are mentioning as they remember him.

He was a highly intelligent man, well read, and interested in a great many subjects including technology, the Arts and the environment. He was deeply interested in religion and constantly sought answers to his questions about faith. It is clear from all of those who knew him that he was interested in everything and everyone he came across

during over 22,000 solo royal engagements he undertook on behalf of the royal family. He was particularly interested and enjoyed talking to everyday people doing everyday jobs. He was President of 800 different organizations but will be remembered most keenly for creating the Duke of Edinburgh Award in 1956 which has inspired so many young people and given them great life skills.

I have been reflecting upon servanthood and what it means to us as Christians seeking to serve our Lord. I was reminded of Jesus Christ's act of washing his disciples' feet during the Last Supper.(John 13:3-11) It was a role usually undertaken by servants and as we know Peter was not initially going to allow his Master to abase himself in this way. Jesus' reply was "Unless, I wash you, you will have no share with me." For us it means that unless we are prepared to be served and to serve others then we cannot consider ourselves true Christians. That act was symbolic of Jesus Christ's life of healing and teaching those who were drawn to him. His ultimate act of servanthood was to die on the cross to serve both God and humanity to secure forgiveness for our sins and eternal life with the Father. The disciples would go on to serve in the same way bringing people to faith. It is their service that resulted in the spread of Christianity and the writing of the Gospels and the New Testament.

We are all called to serve in different ways. They may not be grand but they are all valued and blessed by God. In the last year we have witnessed the devoted service of the NHS staff at all levels, the dedicated work of scientists developing a vaccine for the whole of humanity, and many ordinary people who have served their neighbours by doing simple acts of kindness to help during this challenging time.

God calls us all to serve each other, regardless of status, with love in our hearts and Jesus Christ was the example to follow. I have been reminded of that lovely hymn:

Brother, sister, let me serve you, let me be as Christ to you: pray that I may have the grace to let you be my servant too.
