Dear Friends,

On a retirement course I was on they delightfully told us about all the physical things that change as you get older! I think we all know about the aches and pains, but sight is also greatly affected. As we get older we do not see colour so brightly and we don't see the difference in shades so well. Sometime later I was having a conversation with someone else and telling them this, he told me he was colour blind and I wondered how that would affect him. And I was fascinated as he talked about what he did see in place of red and green. Sight is something we take for granted until we begin to lose it.

We have two amazing organs that act as mirrors on the world for us – but it is the optic nerve that transmits impulses to the brain and it is the brain which makes sense of what we see. In fact, it is such a complex system that nearly a third of the entire brain is devoted to vision.

So what happens to those people who have lost their sight or were born without sight? Some would say that they see through touch and a heightening of their other senses and the window of their imagination. As well as seeing literally, we 'see' beyond the object, our environment and the people around us.

On the third day, with tears obscuring their vision, the women went to the tomb. What did they see? Even though they talked to Jesus, because in their heart they thought he was dead, they could not see. Their eyes had to be opened through words not sight. We often do not see what is right in front of us.

As you go through this week open your eyes. Go for a walk and concentrate on what you see. Look carefully at your surroundings, don't attempt to touch or smell, but look at the colour, the shape, the detail. And stop – and look again – think to the day of resurrection – what do you see. In this season of Eastertide can you see the risen Christ?

The Earth is the LORD's, and everything in it. Psalm 24

Today is Earth Day, an annual event focussed on supporting environmental protection worldwide. It is also the 5th anniversary of the signing of the Paris Agreement in which 191 nations committed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and work to limit the rise in global average temperature below 2 °C with an ambition to limit the increase to 1.5°C (compared with pre-industrial levels). At the time this was widely seen as one of the best opportunities to mitigate global warming and reduce the worst impacts of climate change in the long-term. And whilst many positive steps have been taken, not least the United States re-joining the Agreement this year, it is also clear that much is still to be done. At times it can feel overwhelming, but caring properly for God's Earth is going to need big changes at all levels of society –from individuals, communities, churches, business, and governments.

Here is a prayer for Earth Day:

Eternal God, we pray for your changing world.

Accept our sorrow for the ways we have collectively failed to care for your creation.

Reinvigorate our compassion for our neighbours around the world already suffering the consequences of climate change.

Thank you for the message of Easter –that in your resurrection life there is ...Hope that joy will emerge from despair.

Drive us daily to ask what we can do to care for your world.

And inspire those with the power to bring about positive change.
