### **Psalms of Praise and Climate Change.**

Some weeks ago several of our ministers and local preachers attended a course run by Wesley House Cambridge called: Preaching Good News into the Climate Crisis. Although I wasn't one of those who took part, I have been interested in what was taught on the course. At our recent Local Preachers meeting we had a really good discussion about the course which has enabled us to look more closely at the world around us.

As a circuit we have agreed to become an Eco circuit and many of our churches have begun the journey to become an Eco church. At Stowmarket we are quite a way into the process, and we are hoping that soon we will achieve the first award. To achieve this we needed to develop our land. If you know Stowmarket church you may think we have no land. However, our car park is just the right sort of land we needed. For years we have spent hours trying to clear away all the weeds and brambles that intrude onto our parking area. Now though we can safely leave it and 'wild' it to encourage wildlife to come and stay. We have provided bug hotels and have a 'wild' garden planter.

With all this in the background I have tried to use creation in the services I lead. I am trying to be mindful and intentional so that at least one element of my service reflects the world around us. On Sunday I used that wonderful psalm of praise Psalm 148.

It speaks to us about the earth, fire, hail, snow and frost. About sea creatures and farm animals about all the peoples of the earth and is also inclusive in language, speaking of men and women, young and old. Although I had chosen to use this Psalm it wasn't until it was read at the service that I really listened to it with my Eco climate focussed ear. You know how you can hear or read something dozens of times and suddenly then it speaks anew to you. That is what happened to me. I heard all that the Psalm was expressing. That we need to praise God in good times and bad, in snow and sunshine, in neatly mowed lawns or ragged wild areas.

If you haven't already had the opportunity, please do visit the Every Garden Matters exhibition at the Museum of Food (Formerly the Museum of East Anglian Life) in Stowmarket. This focuses on how we can do our own personal bit to save the planet one garden at the time. Each of us can give a little of our gardens to 'wild' and provide bug hotels.

Here are some verses from Psalm 148 which express all that is good in God's creation.

#### Praise the Lord!

Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise him in the heights!
Praise him, sun and moon; praise him, all you shining stars!
Praise the Lord from the earth, you sea monsters and all deeps, fire and hail, snow and frost, Mountains and all hills, fruit trees and all cedars!
Wild animals and all cattle, creeping things and flying birds!
Praise the Lord! Amen.

FACILITIES: Compostable toilet, Parking component within the scheme whereby a Methodist circuit or district could register and work towards becoming an Eco Circuit or Eco District Eco Circuit/Eco District will not be a whole new scheme, with its own Eco Survey etc, but something much simpler whereby a circuit or district can register its interest in and work towards an award. This acts as an incentive to be working both at circuit/district level and encouraging local church-level engagement with Eco Church. To become an Eco Circuit/Eco District, the circuit or district needs to:

- 1. Have registered its intent.
- 2. Have established a point person or group to act within the circuit or district.
- 3. Have written an environmental policy that has been agreed by a circuit meeting or district synod. This should include points on travel, the environmental performance of manses (taking into account the Methodist Church standing order guidelines on Energy Performance Certificates1) and a commitment to reducing carbon emissions. 1 The Constitutional Practice and Discipline of the Methodist Church, Book VII Part 2, Guidance on Provision of Adequate Accommodation for Manses (See

http://www.methodist.org.uk/static/rm/guidelines\_for\_manses.pdf, page 14) 4. Have achieved the EC Bronze/Silver/Gold level in the Buildings category for its district/circuit offices (where appropriate) and land (where appropriate).

- 5. Have gained a number of Eco Church awards across the circuit or district according to the criteria listed in the appendix below.
- 6. Have sought to ensure that environmental issues are embedded within the curricula of ongoing presbyteral and local preacher education and support.
- 7. Have managed any circuit or district investments with due consideration to the environmental implications/opportunities of such investments, taking into account the climate change investment policy of the Central Finance Board of the Methodist Church2 and the resources available within the Ethical Money Churches project.3
  - 8. Be working with other denominations and/or other faiths to promote environmental awareness and Eco Church.
- 9. Be recording and celebrating individual environmental initiatives. These criteria closely reflect those of the Eco Diocese scheme adopted by the Church of England (see http://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/eco-diocese/).

#### **Trinity Sunday - Caroline Edwards**


I am often asked how our youngest child was named. She was not born on Trinity Sunday as some people have questioned previously. She was born on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of the month, the youngest of three children and the daughter of a Priest (my husband), so it seemed quite apt for her to be named Trinity. My husband and I considered how many references to her name there may be in her life; the number of churches with the same name (I obviously didn't know I would later be based at Trinity MC!), the relevance of her name spiritually and how nice it would be to have a name that triggered so many questions. What we hadn't considered at the time was what it would be like for her as a tiny toddler in church on her first Trinity Sunday!

All was well when we arrived, we'd found a parking spot and actually managed to arrive on time and far from flustered to a Church Service; which was in itself a rare occasion with 3 children. The service started without a hitch and then the sermon began, the preacher mentioned that it was Trinity Sunday and my eldest children chuckled between themselves. My little Trinity looked up from her toys, confused but very clearly listening to what was happening around her. The sermon continued, as did Trinity's intrigue as to why someone stood at the front was mentioning her name. She gradually crept further and further to the front of church to find out what was going on. The Priest, who continued his sermon, was totally unaware of the impact he was having on the tiny toddler shuffling towards him. As he continued talking about the relevance of the Father, Son & Holy Spirit, and exactly at the point his words mentioned 'the importance of Trinity', my Trinity had had enough of him calling her name, shouted a very loud 'aroo' sound and grabbed his leg! Somewhat surprised at first, - and naturally losing his train of thought he looked down, smiled then laughed hysterically along with the rest of the congregation at the timing of Trinity's interruption, the relevance of his sermon on Trinity Sunday and new meaning (at least in their church) of the importance of Trinity Sunday! As my husband says, the Priest met Trinity in 2 ways that day, and perhaps Trinity met with the mystery of faith herself! Be careful what you name your child and remember that children are always listening!

Over the weekend we had talks on Benedictine spirituality from Jutta Brueck, an Anglican priest who has been involved in monastic communities for many years and from Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury. Both spoke on the importance of community life,

contemplation and on silence. There were four workshops to choose from in which the influence of St Benedict on modern day life was examined and discussed.

Sunday was a very special day where for the first time in the history of the cathedral (from its inception) there was a Roman Catholic Mass followed by an ecumenical Eucharist. The mass was celebrated by Bishop Alan Hopes (Roman Catholic) and the sermon preached by Bishop Martin Seeley, followed by a Sung Eucharist in which the roles were reversed. It was wonderful to have these two services together in Christian unity, and there were many of us there who hope that this can be repeated in future years.

Afterwards we had the opportunity to view some ancient manuscripts from the Abbey Scriptorium. When the Abbey was closed by Henry VIII, its library had about 3,000 books. Of these only 270 survive; 121 of the books that remain

are in the possession of Pembroke College, Cambridge who have loaned 7 of the manuscripts for the 1000 years celebration. They are quite beautiful –

#### Abiding Wisdom - Jane Brooker

Abiding Wisdom at St Edmundsbury Cathedral – Article from Jane Brooker 1000 years of Benedictine spirituality was celebrated this month with a conference at St Edmundsbury Cathedral over a weekend in the middle of May. Benedictines from monastries, lay communities, churches and of varied denominations all came to celebrate the founding of the Abbey at St Edmundsbury by King Cnut about 1000 years ago. It was in 1020 that King Cnut ordered a round stone church to be built to house the body of St Edmund – the celebration was to have been in 2020 but, like so many other events, was delayed due to COVID.

For those not familiar with the story, St Edmund was a young king captured by Vikings (Danish) who tried to persuade him to abandon his Christian faith; had he done so they would have allowed him to remain a king, but under their control. He refused to do so and was tied to a tree and then shot with multiple arrows. He was then beheaded and his head thrown into woods. His body was found, and his men heard a wolf crying to them "hic, hic" (which means here, here). When they followed the wolf's call they found the wolf guarding the king's head which was then reunited with his body. Body and head then fused together which is considered to be the first of many miracles.



I have attached a picture of the wolf's head (I suspect not a real wolf!), and a sculpture of the young king with a wolf beside him, and also a picture of a tapestry displaying the martyrdom of King Edmund with Viking longships in the background. All can be seen at the Cathedral.

## **Charmaine Yip**

Although raised in a Christian home, Charmaine only came to saving faith ten years ago. With her conversion came a hunger for the Bible, a book she had previously found dull and impenetrable. Charmaine has seen her life transformed by God's Word and now has a passion to make Jesus known through gospel proclamation. She loves the timeless relevance of the Bible and its application to constantly evolving social issues, particularly those relating to justice and equality.

Charmaine has no preaching experience to date but draws her inspiration from her paternal great grandmother who, as a widow with two young daughters, was transported from India to work as an indentured servant in South Africa and taught the Bible in her native Telegu to fellow labourers. Charmaine is 52 years old and lives in Bromley.

What inspired you to enter Sermon of the Year and what would you say to those thinking about entering next year?

If it wasn't for Sermon of the Year, I'd never have dreamed of writing a sermon! Not only is this event a wonderful opportunity for preachers of different experience (or none) to get valuable feedback from seasoned judges, it's also a great launching pad for fledgling or aspiring preachers like me. Thanks to all at *Preach* magazine for running it.

Last year I wrote my first sermon and it was placed among the top ten entrants, so this year I wanted to enter again but wasn't sure about the text. A wise friend advised me to take a piece of scripture and pray into it for a few days. It was amazing to see how the Holy Spirit opened the text to me and showed me its riches and relevance to the topic.

I would say to those thinking about entering next year, especially all the aspiring preachers out there, to be sensitive to the leading of the Spirit and go for it! Ultimately, it's not about us preachers; it's about what God can accomplish through us. My prayer is that the Spirit glorifies Jesus and makes Him real to people through the sermons in this event.

#### **Katharine Crew**

Katharine is 30 and works at Union Chapel Church as their Social Justice and Community Outreach Worker. She lives in Harpenden, Hertfordshire and was recently accredited as a Methodist Local Preacher in the West Hertfordshire and Borders Circuit. The circuit contains a range of churches from larger town centre churches to smaller village chapels, and includes her home church, High Street Methodist Church, Harpenden. Katharine began preaching as a teenager in her circuit's Youth Worship Team, where she loved the encouragement of knowing her perspective was valued. After not preaching while at university, she felt its absence from her life and began to explore her call to preach. She is particularly keen to bring under-represented voices into her services, and to encourage other people to explore a call to preach so that a broad range of perspectives are heard. In her spare time Katharine enjoys dancing, acting, and learning Welsh.

What inspired you to enter Sermon of the Year and what would you say to those thinking about entering next year?

I've been following the Sermon of the Year competition for years now and my favourite thing about this competition is that I get to read/ hear sermons from people I otherwise wouldn't have heard from. To me a joy of preaching is that God uses us to preach. God could inspire every preacher to preach the exact same sermon, but God chooses not to. Instead God uses our gifts, knowledge and experiences to add to our sermons. So each new preacher I hear offers me an insight to God that only they can bring.

We face a real problem in the church if we only hear sermons from narrow perspectives – particularly those who have been traditionally privileged. There's been so many times I've sat in church frustrated because women have been erased or because I don't understand the sermon illustrations which are before my time. The joy I feel at relating to a sermon or learning from a new perspective, reminds me how valuable it is that everyone is encouraged to preach.

To those thinking of entering next year I'd say go for it. Sermon of the Year celebrates the art of preaching and recognises that each person can teach us
