The Parable of the Talents

'For it is as if a man, going on a journey, summoned his slaves and entrusted his property to them; to one

he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability. Then he went away. The one who had received the five talents went off at once and traded with them, and made five more talents. In the same way, the one who had the two talents made two more talents. But the one who had received the one talent went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those slaves came and settled accounts with them. Then the one who had received the five talents came forward, bringing five more talents, saying, "Master, you handed over to me five talents; see, I have made five more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master." And the one with the two talents also came forward, saying, "Master, you handed over to me two talents; see, I have made two more talents." His master said to him, "Well done, good and trustworthy slave; you have been trustworthy in a few things, I will put you in charge of many things; enter into the joy of your master." Then the one who had received the one talent also came forward, saying, "Master, I knew that you were a harsh man, reaping where you did not sow, and gathering where you did not scatter seed; so I was afraid, and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here you have what is yours." But his master replied, "You wicked and lazy slave! You knew, did you, that I reap where I did not sow, and gather where I did not scatter? Then you ought to have invested my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have received what was my own with interest. So take the talent from him, and give it to the one with the ten talents. For to all those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. As for this worthless slave, throw him into the outer darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth."

Reflection



I'd like us to think this morning about 'The Snowball Effect'!

I'm sure that like me you remember your childhood days when the first signs of snow were greeted with jubilation! We would go out in the garden and make a snowball, then roll it round the lawn. It accumulated

more and more snow as it went, until it was big enough to make the snowman's body, then similarly with the head.

We could look at this parable in that way, too. All three servants started small, some smaller than others, and the first two accumulated more and more as they worked at it. The third, as we know, was not so successful.

We all know people like these servants. Some seem to have so many gifts and graces and they work hard to use them, not only for their own benefit, but for the good of others. These are not always the 'noisy' ones. Many of them are beavering away behind the scenes, using what God has given them and developing their faith, in the power of the Spirit.

I often feel sad for the third servant. Maybe he found it hard to be given so little in comparison with the rest, maybe he didn't really know what he should be doing, or maybe he was just a bit careless with what was entrusted to him. However, we have all been entrusted with something and, like this servant, we have to account for what we have done with it.

Are **we** faithfully engaged on the business God has entrusted to **our** particular care?

Sometimes we may reflect on which of the servants most resembles us and it's possible we could conclude that there are elements of all three in us. There are times when we rejoice in the many gifts God has given us and, like with the snowball, we work really hard at using them. In doing so, we feel a growing sense of the Spirit's presence and power, we are deepening our faith and seeing its outworking in bearing fruit. At other times, the snowball is not gathering so much snow as we wearily push it round, but we press on and are able to present some harvest to the Lord. In the worst times we sense we have got no further than the initial snowball we started with, and we even think of giving up and hiding away.

What can we do about it? 2 Peter 1. 3-8 suggests that God is looking for a response from us to what He has given us. Patient endurance, Godliness and love for everyone are just three of the gifts we can offer to God to be multiplied in His generous hands. Verse 8 concludes 'The more you grow like this, the more productive and useful you will be in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.'

'The Man Who Planted Acorns' is the tale of a shepherd who planted 100 acorns at a time in a desolate landscape. Over the years he planted 100,000, of which about 10,000 grew into mature trees. Now there is a huge forest covering a large

expanse, where once there was nothing. (You can watch the short film of this story on YouTube.)

So, as we work at it now, the snowball will grow and grow, and something great will be accomplished by each servant of the Lord, no matter how many or few their gifts.
